


The Challenge: Declining Enrollment and Empty Spaces

Traditional District Schools Enrollment is Declining



Charter School Enrollment Is Increasing

Ultimately,
repurposing half-empty—
or worse—district buildings
for in-demand charter schools
is about leveraging public
resources and potential
cost savings for districts
and charter
schools.





Expand Educational Opportunities



• Charter Enrollment: 136,000


 264 district buildings with average 47.6% utilization (~790 unused seats at each)

Average charter school enrollment: 532 students



National Context: Widespread trend

- Brookings: Districts may lose 8.5M students by 2050.
- Arizona: Districts use ²/₃ capacity;
 charters use 95%.
- Funding imbalance: districts retain more resources despite enrollment loss.





Florida's Charter Growth Story

Percent of schools earning an "A" Grade




Charters have proven themselves a valid option for student success.

- 77% of charters earn "A" or "B."
- Only 4% of charters in district facilities
 vs. 18% nationally.
- Legislation (SB 2510) expands Schools of Hope access to district space.
- While S2510 only focuses on Schools of Hope, opportunities (and precedent) exist to allow traditional charters and districts to develop agreements.



Enrollment & Population Trends

Student Population is up, district enrollment is down.





Data Foundation



- 20 districts were analyzed representing 90% of FL charters.
 - All districts with 8 or more charter schools operating.
- 2,250 district buildings assessed via DOE's Five-Year Work Plans.





Data Sources

- We used the "Five Year Educational Work Plan Data", available from the Florida Department of Education from 2021 to 2024.
- Did not include nontraditional options like adult education, Career and Technical Education Centers, or Department of Juvenile Justice.
- Florida Department of Education enrollment data, home education annual reports, private school annual reports and directories, as well as the American Community Survey (ACS) Age and Sex population 5-Year estimates.



Important Definitions

Our study uses the term "Utilization Rate": These are a district/state calculated metric in the Five-Year Educational Work Plans as the prior year COFTE divided by the capacity of the building.

COFTE = Capital Outlay Full-Time Equivalent (project model used for facilities planning and funding for Florida's public schools).





Emptying Classrooms: Utilization Trends

- Low-utilization (50%) buildings are up from 8% to 13% (109 more).
- Average utilization is down from 75% to 70%.
- 500+ empty seats per half-full building.

Charter Facility Challenge

Facility costs are a major barrier for charter expansion.

New charters: 25% of budget on facilities

• Established charters: 15%

"Facility issues are the #1 issue facing our ability to maintain or expand."



Quantifying the Opportunity

- 264 district buildings could host an average charter (532 students)
- 645,000 available seats
- 77 surplus district buildings vs. 256 charter facility needs.



Fiscal Case for Collaboration

Average per pupil expenditures and state funding for charter schools



Repurposing facilities = better use of taxpayer dollars.

- Charter spends: \$2,077/student
- State funding: \$530/student
- Local funding: \$393/student
- Typical charter: \$1.1M/year on facilities
- 100 schools relocating = \$110.5M
 redirected to instruction

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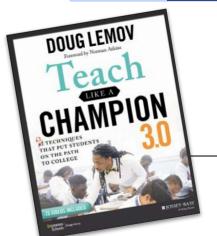








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
